

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














BRAVO ZULU. FUN FACTS


BRAVO ZULU is a naval signal, meaning "Well Done";
It is used by flaghoist as well as speech and in writing.
It can be combined with the "negative" signal, spoken or written
NEGAT, to say "NEGAT Bravo Zulu", or "not well done".

In the US Navy, "well done" was originally signaled as TVG, or "Tare Victor George". "Bravo Zulu" actually comes from an international naval signal code adopted after the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) was created in 1949. Until then, each navy had used its own signal code and operation manuals. World War II experience had shown that it was difficult, or even impossible, for ships of different navies to operate together unless they could readily communicate, and this was the remedy.

At the time BZ was not rendered as "Bravo Zulu", but in each navy's particular radio alphabet. In the U.S. Navy, BZ was spoken as "Baker Zebra". In the meantime, the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) had adopted English as the international air traffic control language. They developed a radio alphabet for international aviation use, designed to be as "pronounceable" as possible by flyers and traffic controllers speaking many different languages. The U.S. Navy adopted this ICAO alphabet in March 1956. It was then that "Baker Zebra" finally became "Bravo Zulu".

"Don't Give Up The Ship" were the dying words of James Lawrence in 1813 to his officers when his frigate USS Chesapeake was overwhelmed by a British boarding party.

The flag depicted in Memorial Hall was actually flown by Oliver Hazard Perry on board his flagship Lawrence and again on Perry's ship Niagra when he transferred command there during battle.
